Conversations and adventures shared at MAFCA Convention in Loveland, Colorado

t the Banquet, we sat at a table with two couples who drove their Model A's from south of Indianapolis, Indiana. The intrepid group had 4 couples who planned the trip. Before leaving one guy decided on having an EKG done. He was happy that the EKG was normal but as he stood up he had a massive heart attack and was rushed to emergency room for multiple bypass surgery. That couple had to stay home. A second traveler from the group got up the morning before, had a sudden leg cramp and fell, breaking his toes and hitting his head. Off to the hospital for him. That couple, too, had to stay home. The remaining two couples decided to go anyway, and got through the first day. After trying to start out the next day, one Model A could not start and had to have a spare distributor installed. Finally, after arriving in Loveland and trying to participate in the first tour, one of the small group's Model A's burned out the center main bearing and had to be shipped home, leaving the couple to finish out the meet in a rental car. Maybe that should have been the hard luck group.

We did get an emergency overheating cure tip from them, however. On a previous trip, after experiencing an overheated engine, he purchased a hand pump lawn chemical spray set up, with a length of rubber tubing. He attached the tubing to the sprayer and ran the other end to the front of the radiator and attached it to the cross bar. Then he filled the spray container with water. His wife was tasked with watching the temperature gauge and if it rose to a certain level she would pump a few squirts right on the radiator. Cooled it right down every time.

Our motel was very tour friendly and accommodating to everyone. It was only about two miles from the event center and had a gas station, an Arby's, and an excellent Mexican restaurant just a few steps away. It seemed like the parking lot was a garage, as there was always someone working on their car — wheels were off, carburetors were disassemble all over, and timing gears were being changed. This stressed both cooling systems and brakes. The food was excellent, the scenery unbeatable with Rocky Mountain

Park and Longs Peak always close, and the cool mountain temperature very welcome. All week there were hundreds of Model A's motoring throughout the Front Range.

It was a wonderful, well prepared and managed meet. The bus tours were very informative with lots of laughs along the way. Who knew Colorado mining Molly Brown baroness of "Unsinkable Molly Brown" fame was actually Margaret Brown and was never called Molly during her lifetime?

A good time was had by (almost) all with many memorable events! We hope the next one is as good!!!





On August 25, 1916, President Woodrow Wilson signed the act creating the National Park Service, a new federal bureau in the Department of the Interior, responsible for protecting the 35 national parks and monuments then managed by the department and those yet to be established. Throughout 2016, the National Park Service (NPS) has been celebrating its 100th anniversary with a series of centennial events. Parks across the country have been engaging communities through recreation, conservation, and historic preservation programs.

As the official founding date of the NPS approaches, Tumacácori prepares for its birthday party. "We invite friends, neighbors, and everyone who appreciates public land to find their park and discover the national parks and programs in their own backyards," says Superintendent Bob Love. "Birthdays are significant and a 100th birthday deserves special celebration."

All national parks will be offering free entrance from August 25 to August 28, 2016. In addition, from 10:00 AM to 2:00 PM on August 25, Tumacácori will offer visitors a slice of birthday cake, a frozen treat, and a chance to play a variety of NPS birthday games. Pin the bison on the arrowhead, play Stump the Ranger, browse the Find Your Park map, or share stories of your national park experiences.

MAFCA Membership Deal Expiring Soon


